

VINTAGE TRACTORS SAFELY BACK FROM NORMANDY On Thursday 27th June the port of Newhaven witnessed an extraordinary gathering of over 50 vintage and classic vehicles, comprising nearly 40 tractors supported by vintage cars and commercial vehicles, including one 94 year old steam lorry, waiting to board the midnight ferry to Dieppe.

These vehicles, plus their drivers and crews, were on their way to a racecourse near the town of Gournay-en-Bray in Normandy where a biennial show celebrating French farming and rural crafts was to be held.

This was however much more than just a jolly boys' and girls' outing to France as it was all part



of a well organised plan by the 'Chailey Classic & Vintage Tractor Club" to visit their French counterparts "Passion Tracteurs Collection' of Gournay-en-Bray, a town that is twinned with Hailsham in Sussex, after many months of preparation.

As the result of a meeting held in Gournay-en-Bray in 2018, a bond of friendship had grown between CCVTC members and the Normandy towns in the area that still remember, with grateful thanks, their liberation following the D-day landings in June 1944.

The group was organised into two separate convoys and the route from Dieppe took the vehicles through Neufchatel, thereafter, stopping for a formal lunch in the livestock market of Forges-Les-Eaux (twinned with Heathfield) where the group was formally greeted by the town's Mayor and dignitaries.

Following speeches and the exchange of gifts, the convoy moved off en mass with Police escort to its final destination. On arrival in Gournay-en-Bray, the British contingent drove through the town to cheers and flag waving and was received by the town's Mayor and his dignitaries. The reception included members of both Hailsham twinning and their French counterparts.

A minibus was sponsored and provided by owner and Director David Chewter of Parkers of Haywards Heath who drove himself with two colleagues, to ferry members and guests between





the racecourse and the town throughout the weekend.

The event at the racecourse took place last weekend (29th/30th June) and focused on agricultural bygones and the importance of agriculture, a sentiment shared by Chailey Tractor Club.

On the Saturday evening, the French tractor club PTC provided a communal evening meal for all involved and throughout the weekend English and French produce was exchanged in equal measure. CCVTC, thanks to its local sponsors, Harveys and Longman Breweries, Bluebell Vineyard, Southdown Cider and High Weald Dairy, took across fine English beer, sparkling and still wine, cider and cheese, all of which went down very well with the French.

The weekend was well attended by many from the Normandy farming community, celebrated its history, featuring demonstrations of some of the oldest methods of farming. Normandy remains a very significant area for agriculture and the British presence contributed to a collection of some 500 vintage and classic tractors and associated machinery.



The British lines had its own marquee and significant area, British machines and living vans were displayed accordingly and to the delight of many, a narrow-gauge steam railway was set up and operated by its own dedicated team of steam enthusiasts. Similarly, a 1930s Sentinel steam lorry made regular circuits of the site complete with its payload of younger CCVTC members to the tunes of an accordion that provided music throughout the weekend.

Club Chairman, Howard Venters, told us "It was heartening to see the absolute camaraderie not only within our own group but with our French colleagues. Clearly the history and celebration of vintage and classic machines are as important to the French as they are to us and there is a clear mutual understanding of the importance of rural affairs, communities and food production. I think it is fair to say that our presence contributed significantly to the event, everybody was friendly and respectful, and the demographic profile of our Club's attendance spanned older and younger members. In fact, our youngest member has only just celebrated her first birthday."

NEWS FROM STONEYWISH On one of the hottest days of the year I found myself in the Tropical Glasshouse at Kew Gardens. The first impression is one of diving into a limpid underwater world. Pressing in upon all sides are the fantastic forms of palm fronds, creepers, aerial roots and flowers as bright as parakeets or birds of paradise. The air smells green. Tendrils and buds emit encrypted messages, intelligible only to one another, but perceptible to humans as a vibrancy, an exuberance of life. Everything is thriving and thrusting forth as if determined to provide living proof of an expanding universe. Only animal life is lacking to complete the illusion. But it would be easy enough to imagine tree frogs and monkeys amongst the foliage, just as, with a little more effort one could conjure up the Victorian visitors who first promenaded through this 'jungle' on their Sunday afternoons. Just past the Victoria Gate stands a red-brick gallery, built to house the paintings of the intrepid artist/explorer Marianne North. A wealthy heiress, long inspired by the exotic plants at Kew, Miss North defied 19th century convention and set off for the farthest corners of the globe in search of botanical treasures. While her contemporaries devoted themselves to *collecting* plants, she *painted* them in situ, setting up her easel in the forest to produce over a thousand exquisitely detailed landscapes and plant studies. The paintings at Kew are displayed as she directed, jammed together, frame to frame, like panels in a lacquered cabinet and cover every inch of wall from dado rail to ceiling. The effect is quite overwhelming and creates a sensory shock very much like the shock of entering the Tropical Glasshouse. Wherever you look, there are the same extraordinary forms, the same vivid colours – a realisation that here is more than can be coherently absorbed and codified, though scientists do use them as data reference for research. The juxtaposition of so many different perspectives sets up cross-resonances, which, like the encrypted messages of the plants themselves, are best felt, however, rather than read. When Reason is confounded in this way, something rather miraculous can happen art does not merely depict life but *assumes* it and conveys its living dynamic, straight to the heart. Science is busy identifying and tracking the secret communication systems which exist in the botanic world. Whether by hormone and pheromone signals, or exchanges of nutrients, or electrical stimuli, or some other as yet undreamt of 'invisible ink', we know that messages are conveyed and that the air, soil and water are humming with them. We ourselves unwittingly partake in this traffic and respond to it at a vibrational level. Occasionally, intuitive feelings overwhelm us when we are in Nature and we realise with a start that there *are* more than we know, and that we already know more than we can comfortably acknowledge. Beyond the piecemeal filing systems of the analytical mind, lies an ocean which defies reduction – a whole, greater than any sum of its parts. Let's call it vitality - or viriditas -(Hildegard of Bingen's word) – a force which heals and brings all things into harmony. You can feel it in wild places and in human relations where trust is automatic. To step from a manmade environment into the wild is to feel a sudden surge of energy as the volume of this bio-intelligence increases a hundredfold. The ability to detect it may be counted as a sixth sense, and perhaps the most important of them all, which I will call the gift of imagination. Children are born with it. Watch a child talking to a daisy, and it is immediately plain that that they can hear what the daisy says back! Thus William Blake could sav:

"The tree which moves some to tears of joy is in the eyes of others only a green thing that stands in the way. Some see nature all ridicule and deformity... some scarce see nature at all. But to the eyes of the man of imagination, nature is imagination itself."

We not only belong to the cosmos, we are worlds unto ourselves. Our own bodies are, quite unbeknown to ourselves, buzzing with internal communications: neural/electrical, bacterial, hormonal, chemical... gut talking to brain, brain replying to heart, fat (via leptin) talking to just about everything. Each one of us is a veritable Tower of Babel, and our cells carry on independent conversations with everything imaginable in our environment, quietly knitting us into existence as evolutionary beings. Do we understand even a fraction of it? No. Do we need to trust it? Most certainly, yes!

According to Martín Prechtel, the Tzutujil people of Guatemala have a beautiful way of describing this 'belonging' through the unfolding evolution of the child in the womb. Every child, they believe, passes through four layers of creation before incarnating as Earth Fruit in physical form and each of these processes is overseen by a pair of ancient Deities, known as Old Man and Old Woman, who summon the bodily elements into existence through a series of magical incantations. The first layer of creation is fiery, and here are forged the bones, the heart and the gall-bladder of the baby. The second layer, flesh, comes from the earth, because earth gives life to plants and plants feed flesh. The third, providing liquid for blood, nerves and all the watery functions of the body, draws on rivers, seas, mists, springs, lakes and rainstorms, while the fourth brings vision and



breath from the spirit of the wind and of air-breathing animals.

Finally, in the fifth creation, the child is given its identity. A child thus embodies the evolution of the earth itself and is consecrated to its care. The thread which binds every atom of the child to its environment conveys the messages necessary for survival from the external elements of which it is composed for the whole of its life. Imagine that! No feeling lost and lonely on a doomed and insentient rock. When a forest is felled, or a field is bull-dozed, it is not merely the biota which is lost, but all the vital things that that integrated world has to say. And until we can once more feel, like our Highland Mayan cousins, that our lungs are trees, and our hearts are birds and that we have rivers flowing inside us, perhaps we will never be able to receive the teachings these things hold for us. Perhaps the best we will be able to do is to create glass-house illusions and painterly illusions, while our society gets on with the serious business of global destruction. Suppose it turns out that the final frontier is actually our own interior landscape and the dreams by which the world claims kinship with us? Could we better deserve the privilege of being human? Kew is a miracle, but it is only a beginning – and it points us towards a magical intimation of how the world could be if only imagination was given a chance.



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GRANTS TOTALLING £20,000 HAVE BEEN AWARDED TO A RANGE OF DITCHLING ORGANISATIONS BY THE TURNER-DUMBRELL FOUNDATION. At its AGM the trustees of the charity agreed to

make grants to: Beacon Parish for both upkeep and maintenance of St Margaret's churchyard and renovation of a tapestry designed and woven by the renowned Ditchling weaver Hilary Bourne. FPTA of Ditchling Primary School towards playspace resurfacing.

The Monday Group for annual fixed costs of footpath maintenance. Ditchling Scouts Group for activity days. Oldland Mill for a timber survey. The Inter-village Sports Day for equipment. Ditchling Cricket Club for equipment and Ditchling Pavilion for improvements.

The grants are funded by rental income from the charity's land and property holdings. Land owned by the Turner-Dumbrell Foundation comprises Lodge Hill and the neighbouring Bowries Fields as well as the site of the Community Orchard, and it also owns the workshops as you head north out of the village. Meanwhile the Foundation has been making progress on its project to revitalise the ecology of Lodge Hill. Cattle have been reintroduced after a six-year absence and together with work by the Monday Group and volunteers from the South Downs National Park will help to control the bracken, which was threatening to overwhelm less vigorous plants on the site. Work to eradicate bamboo, which has invaded part of site, is scheduled to be carried out in September, and the foundation apologies in advance if this causes any disruption on Boddingtons Lane.

Further proposals to plant more native trees to fill out the copse at the bottom of the hill, and to introduce more ponds to help with drainage, are also under consideration. Engagement with residents has also been stepped up with children from St Margaret's School visiting the hill with more visits being planned for the next academic year. In addition the foundation has funded free guided nature walks led by local naturalist Michael Blencowe, highlighting the birdlife and butterflies to be seen there. It is also hoped a bat walk, which had to be postponed in the spring, can be rearranged for later in the year.

A vivid illustration of the Foundation's commitment to the environment has also been resplendent alongside its workshops in North End. Careful nurturing of the verge enabled more than 60 pyramidal and bee orchids to put on a great display through June and into July.


