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

THE MONDAY GROUP - LUNCE'S COMMON PROJECT AUGUST 2024

The Monday Group has recently completed several improvements to the footpaths across Lunce's Common in the area between Theobald's Road and Church Lane.

The major project has provided a safe walkway uphill from the bridge across the stream on Footpath WIV 1/2. The "Before" photos, taken in July this year, show how waterlogged the surface was even at that time of year. In winter it's almost impossible to traverse! There have also been reports of broken and sprained ankles, and other injuries, to walkers in recent years. Construction, over 4 weeks, required the manufacturing of 7 walkway sections, made of sustainable oak with non-slip decking overlay, and their placement on site to elevate walkers above the impassable surfaces and to allow the natural flow of the water onto the nearby steam. Generous donations from local residents have contributed significantly to this work,

and to some additional tasks in the area including repairs to a nearby stile and an additional handrail at steps further along the path to Wivelsfield.

The Monday Group would also like to thank the owner of the land for allowing us access for our vehicle, allowing us to transport the necessary materials to site - an impossible task to undertake man-Stephen Brewis ually.

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SHAKESPEARE'S STARLINGS - Three Act Tragedy. Hey y'all, I'm mailing in this month's article from my vacation at Bodega Bay on the foggy Pacific coast of California. It may be all organic coffee, art galleries, surfer dudes and flipflops but this quaint coastal community is notorious for being the location for a most sinister film: 'The Birds' (1963). Alfred Hitchcock has long gone but flocks of the film's stars still sit ominously perched on telegraph wires as if unaware that the portly director yelled "cut" 56 years ago. But unlike the local hummingbirds, phoebes and chickadees these particular birds look reassuringly familiar to me. They are Sturnus vulgaris, the European Starling, the same species we see wheeling around Brighton's West Pier in their dramatic amoeboid murmurations. And, like me, they don't really belong here. The Starlings are here thanks to Henry IV. Well, 'Henry IV Part 1' to be precise.

Act I: London, 1597. William Shakespeare scribbles the word 'Starling' in his epic tale of power and treachery. With that feathered flourish of his quill, Shakespeare would unknowingly be the author of an ecological catastrophe that would play out until the present day.

Act II: New York, 1877. Enter stage right Eugene Schieffelin, a socialite who would later be remembered as "an eccentric at best, a lunatic at worst". He chaired the American Acclimatization Society, a group which, despite their nationalistic sounding name, were very keen to welcome foreigners. In





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fact, their aim was to import animals of economic or cultural interest from the Old World to the New. Schieffelin, a big fan of Shakespeare, had a dream: to populate America with every bird mentioned in Shakespeare's writings. And so the bard's birds were boxed up in England and brought to New York where Skylarks, Pied Wagtails, Bullfinches, Nightingales, Chaffinches and many more were 'liberated' into Central Park. The majority of them died. But on March 6, 1890, 60 Starlings (a bird mentioned only once by Shakespeare) were released in Central Park and they fared better. Much better. Today there are around 200 million of them across the United States.

Act III: United States, present day. The story of Schieffelin's Shakespearian motivation may just be an urban legend but the legacy of his misguided American Acclimatization Society is very real. Today European Starlings are widely vilified by Americans as aggressive pests that have destroyed precious ecosystems and turfed out native species. Which is pretty rich coming from a bunch of invasive Europeans who have been doing just that for the past few centuries! And since then there have been many who have appeared hellbent on dismantling this country's environmental regulations which protect wildlife, the landscape and our planet. But sure, let's blame the birds. As Mr Shakespeare (almost) once wrote, "The fault, dear Brutus, is not in our Starlings, / But in ourselves". Sussex Wildlife Trust

The Group isn't a business or agency. It's a club run by volunteers. Come along. You won't regret it.



TWINEHAM C OF E SCHOOL Due to the recent expansion of the Governing Board we are currently seeking 2 new Co-opted (community) Governor appointments and would be delighted if someone who resides nearby would take up the posts/s.

What is a school governor? School governors have a varied and important role, in helping our school run effectively. They have 3 core functions: Planning the strategic direction of the school. Overseeing financial performance of the school and ensuring money is well spent. Holding the head teacher or school leadership to account.

The governor role is strategic rather than operational. Governors don't get involved with the day to day running of a school, instead supporting and challenging the school's leadership team to drive school improvement. They champion the work the school does.

Our governing board - Our board consists of 12 people and we meet all together circa 10 times per year – mainly in person and sometimes via Zoom. We also have a resources committee that governors can join –which oversees how money is spent.

Our governors come from our local community and in their role they: Get to know the school, including visiting the school occasionally during school hours and in agreement with the head teacher to support monitoring of school standards to gain a good understanding of the school's strengths and weaknesses. Attend induction training and regular relevant training and development events. Attend meetings (full governing board meetings and committee meetings) and read all the papers before the meeting. Aact in the best interests of all the pupils of the school. Behave in a professional manner, as set down in the governing board's code of conduct, including acting in strict confidence.

Being a school governor is a commitment and a responsibility but offers you the chance to see first-hand the impact you can make in improving education for children in your community.


Do I need to have certain qualifications? No special qualifications are needed, and the most important thing is to have a keen interest in the school and be prepared to play an active part in the governing body's work.

Each of the Stoolball Ditchling committee received a bottle of wine as a gesture of thanks for their outstanding contribution.



NEWS FROM STONEYWISH Our farm seems to grow worked flints. The bands of sandy soil which run east to west across the land are seeded with flakes, cores, and tools in various stages of completion - all the handiwork of human ancestors from the Deep Past. Michael spots them on his rounds where moles have unearthed them, or the pigs have turned them up with their snouts. They glisten in the sun after rain. They sit in his hand like familiar friends. "This one was a scraper, look. See the indented edge, useful for skinning prey? The shell-like bulge where the hammer-stone struck it free from a larger flint?" They lie strewn, like the dragon's teeth of Greek legend and though they do not spring up as armed men, they do raise legions of questions in my mind when they come home in Michael's pockets and pile up quietly on the window-sill in the hall. Who fashioned them and what kind of world did they inhabit in those faroff Paleolithic days? Their handiwork passes us hints of the reality they knew, of the skills they had honed, of their choice of location. Could they have imagined that some descendant would find and cherish the discarded, perhaps half-worked tools they had abandoned, tens of thousands of years before? Most indigenous societies have a view of time which to us seems back-to-front.

Still, today in Village Africa or among the Inuit, the





Past is the place where man is headed. Humans are destined to join the ancestors which have preceded them, and the job of each individual is a heroic one: to weave Time, which arrives raw and unformed, into something worthy - something which will prove beneficial and life-fulfilling to the young who are to follow them. The Ancestors leave their memory to guide and encourage by example. In this way any and all of them can live on after death and help the living so long as they remain in peoples' minds. The role of the living, meanwhile, is to succour life and earn the respect of those who will one day remember them. Here is the 'seventh generation' that North American Indians honoured when they planted trees for a time, they themselves would not live to see. Surely this is the origin of 'culture': the encoding of memory and knowledge which can safeguard the survival of the community.

Earliest of all were depictions of the hunt - of the life force - fertility – the permutations of the seasons; then tales of heroism – courage and cleverness, (vital qualities in a dangerous world), and notes on medicine, and astronomy... the meaning of life and death... These messages come to us in rock art, in carvings, and then in voices we can actually hear – the remembered lines of epic poems, sagas, and *then* in written form. This is, I suppose, why I have always cared so



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passionately about literature. Ancestral voices reach us this way with a freshness and directness which seems utterly miraculous. The words are gifts, seeds which can germinate anew in anyone's mind for the relatively simple effort of learning the lingo, even after centuries of being lost and buried. That the past can reach out to us in this way has always mesmerised me. As a child, I was lucky enough to have long-lived great-aunts and -uncles who were willing to share with me stories of their own childhoods. These memories brought alive for me scenes of life before the the Great War, of gleaners toiling in the fields in Hampshire, of laundry girls skipping with long ropes in the streets of Brighton... I was hungry then, as now, for any wisdom they could pass on. And what they could tell me, from their humble origins, has certainly withstood the test of time. Their voices still ring in my ears and make my world a companionable place. When we start to listen, there is no end to the stories that the past has for us and we need to hear as many as possible in order to prepare fertile ground for our cultural heirs.

At Stoneywish we have another tangible gift from the past in the form of a 'juvenile' Redwood which is already beginning to tower above other trees in the Pinetum. The tree is a Mountain Redwood, a specimen of *Wellingtonia Gigantea*, among whose veterans are the largest and some of the oldest trees on Earth. A mere fifty or so years ago, the seed of our tree was collected from the Sequoia National Park in California and coaxed into germination here in Sussex. The tree was given to us as a baby, the size of a small Christmas tree, and after 35 years here has reached a height of over 60 feet. Mature trees, felled by foresters in California, have yielded tree-ring readings of over 3,200 years. Seeds of the newly discovered 'Big Trees' arrived in Britain in 1843, and soon provided a fashionable addition to every plantsman's garden. The choice of name, Wellingtonia, was made ten years later as a tribute to Wellington, who had recently died and remained the 'biggest' hero we had at the time. But Sequoias were not really new to Britain and fossil evidence shows that they were growing here long ago, during the Eocene and Miocene Periods. In a sense you could say that our tree has found its way home and already it is producing cones and seeds of its own - messages, encrypting the essence of its DNA for the next 4,000 years? For several mornings this week I have sat, drawing this Redwood, exploring the complexities of its form, the way the light plays through the branches, and simply sitting with the tree has brought me closer to it. Stillness is something we are rarely able to share with trees. We are always in a hurry or have an agenda. We take a proprietorial stance towards them. We decide what must be done, or we extract information, or produce from them. To draw a tree is to reduce oneself in size to the point of a pencil -amere ant - creeping from crevice to crevice in the corrugated bark, or teetering along branches which



extend, like muscular elephant trunks, in all directions. It is a lesson in humility. In fact, I gave myself a stiff neck, craning to take in the monumental outline from my little stool. But my reward was to enter into a communion of stillness, through depths of bruiselike shadow, purple and brown; to share the sweet pungency of soil-infused air, which we breathed together in a detachment outside time. The Scottish naturalist John Muir, one of the first Westerners to celebrate and fight for the preservation of the American Redwoods, experienced this communion as a kind of intoxication when he first came upon them in Yosemite Valley in the 1860s. In his book 'The Wisdom of the Ancients', Neil Oliver quotes from a letter Muir wrote to Jean Carr, wife of his tutor: "The king tree and me have sworn eternal love, sworn it without swearing... I've taken the sacrament in Sequoia wine, Sequoia blood... Seen with sunbeams in it, its colour is the most royal of all purples. I wish I was so drunk and Sequoical I could preach the green brown woods to all the juiceless world, descending from this divine wilderness like a John Baptist." Did Marianne North experience the same feelings when she set up her easel to paint the Big Trees in the Sierras? What is the message these gentle giants have for us today? Logging companies are still destroying ancient redwood forests for lumber at an alarming rate, causing local

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climate change and exacerbating California's wildfire catastrophes. Can we hear anything above the roar of chainsaws? Oliver's movingly humane approach to archaeology finds lingering traces of warmth in the finger-prints of our ancestors. Burials, hearth-places, fragments of everyday life miraculously preserved, hold lessons, warnings and reminders for us about what is timeless and what it means to share this planet. Older ancestors, the animals and plants from which our own species has evolved, also have their own vital tales to tell. If we listen well, Oliver suggests, we will become seed-bearers in turn, ensuring shelter and protection for the present and leaving generous stores for the future. We are not at the end of things. We are in the middle, which is why the Ancient Celts and their cousins the Vikings and Saxons called our place Middle Earth. The challenge facing us all is not so much how to be the last man standing, but how to fashion a message worth leaving behind. Rosemary

The main festival starts Friday 11th October, but before then there are some pre-festival events on offer. The Telling will be performing at The Brunswick in Hove on Wednesday 2nd October, and on the morning of Saturday 5th October musicians from the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment will present their highly popular OAE TOTS concerts for children aged 2 to 5 and their parents, grandparents or carers. The main festival has 13 different lunchtime and evening events. These are scheduled to make it possible for you to attend all of them if you're really keen and if you book for 6 or more in one go, you'll benefit from a 10% discount. All the events are described in detail on the BREMF website (go to www.bremf.org.uk/whats-on/), but here are some of the highlights.

On Friday **11th October** in St George's Church, Kemptown you can hear the ever popular and spectacular Red Priest in Truly, Madly Baroque. On the following day, in the same venue, the Armonico Consort present Family Connections: The Forgotten Scarlatti. A totally different type of event will follow on Sunday **13th October** in St Martin's Church, Brighton, when multiple performers are involved in Origins - an immersive show exploring ancient roots and connections via music, dance and stories from the Mediterranean, India and West Africa.

Music for the 1468 wedding of Margaret of York to

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Charles the Bold of Burgundy will be featured in Connections Of Power on Friday **18th October** (St Bartholomew's Church). The following day is a busy one with three events – Don't Stop The Music, at lunchtime in St Nicholas Church, followed by two events featuring four young emerging professional early music groups; firstly the ever-popular BREMF Live Showcase (Saturday **19th October**, 3.30 pm in St George's Church) and then an informal pub performance by the same groups (9 pm in The Rose Hill). The next day there is a chance to hear the haunting music of Hildegard of Bingen (Sunday **20th October**, 6.30 pm and 8.30 pm in St Martin's).

The final weekend of BREMF has Smock Alley – Irish and Italian music (Friday **25th October** in St George's), Decameron Musicale - musical stories from Medieval Europe (Saturday **26th October** at lunchtime in St Nicholas), French Connections – works by Carissimi, Charpentier and Lully (**26th October** in St Martin's), and Catherine & Mary: Tudor Queens Forever Entwined (**27th October** in St Martin's).

It's been a great year for BREMF, with funding from Arts Council England and a very successful Big Give donation campaign back in March. As well as all that, BREMF's Artistic Director, Deborah Roberts, was awarded a British Empire Medal in the King's Birthday Honours this summer, in recognition of her work in establishing the festival as a major part of the arts scene in Brighton and beyond. If you've been before, you will know that BREMF events are very friendly and welcoming. 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WESTMESTON JUBILEE PATHWAY TRUST - APPEAL FOR VOLUNTEERS

History - Westmeston Parish Hall opened on the first day of the Millenium and immediately became a huge success. The location of the hall at the extreme eastern end of the parish was accessible by car and bicycle but posed difficulties for people wishing to walk, owing to the lack of verges on the high roadside banks. The route along the carriageway was extremely hazardous, at any time, more so for children, and anyone during dusk and the hours of darkness. The parish council was by then meeting at the hall and a proposal was tabled with a view to creating a traffic free safe track from Church Corner to the hall.

In 2002 Councillors Harold Rowling and Rob Mills formed an independent trust resulting in the construction of a surfaced track along the top of the bank on the south side of Lewes Road from Church Corner to the "V" bridleway, continuing on the north verge past Old Middleton to the entrance of the hall. This involved clearing, excavating and rolling in stone on a route that until then could only be traversed with difficulty. It was on ESCC Highway land. The project was financed by local fund raising, charitable gifts from local people, and grant aid. This was not paid for out of council tax, neither are the repairs and maintenance. The pathway proves its value on a daily basis with walkers and riders making use of the safe traverse. Additionally, it links Westmeston Bostal and the "V" Bostal, creating a "circular" route joining South Downs Way opening up a spectacular vista. This was opened in time for Her Majesty's golden iubilee.

Working on similar principles, the trustees built a similar pathway along an embankment on the south side of Lewes Road between Wapple Way and the wide green verge that runs through to a point opposite Spatham Lane. This track had an official opening at Hooks Acre attended by Norman Baker M.P. These two tracks were then linked by clearing a path for pedestrian use through the roadside copse on the north side between Wapple Way and Glebe cottages. This route continued east to the convergence of footpaths opposite April Cottage. It was achieved with the co-operation of private landowners granting the use of permissive paths along the inside of the hedge line.

The trustees aimed to provide a safe route along the

B2116 Lewes Road between the parish boundaries of Ditchling and Streat. Linking up with all the footpaths and bridleways en-route. The next task was reclaiming an impassable track between Spatham Lane and Shirleys. This stretch was within Ditchling parish and on completion it at last enabled people to travel safely between the parishes on foot, bikes or horses. This was followed by surfacing the remaining stretch of verge from Hooks Acre to our track that meets Wapple Way.

The Trust acknowledges the valuable help and co-operation from Monday Group, Footpaths Conservation Society and Mid Sussex Bridleways Group who allocated some funding. These volunteers contributed both financial and practical help in clearing rubbish and overgrowth along the path lines. Thanks go also to the many people who helped financially through our fund-raising events and by personal contributions. The Turner Dumbrell Foundation, Ditchling Ball, Lottery and other charitable trusts provided vital help.

Present Day

The Jubilee Pathway is now used by hundreds of people who wish to walk safely from Ditchling to Westmeston and link up with bridleways and footpaths which crisscross the area. Many users have no idea that this is a charitable project paid for and maintained by donation and volunteers.

With the increase in use and the wetter winters comes the need for more maintenance to keep the pathway open.

We are a small charity with only 4 volunteers and we need more local people to help us by offering to join working parties. We don't need expertise using chainsaws etc, although that would be welcome in a few places! We need willing hands who can use secateurs etc. to clear weeds and undergrowth away from the path. Presently we have been very fortunate to have had help from the Monday group but they have a huge area to cover and time is limited.

Without help these pathways will gradually disappear as growth makes them narrower and narrower and the ease .of passage will disappear with them

Every year the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal demonstrates the generosity of the general public.

Poppy Appeal will launch this year on **17th October** with unmanned boxes being in many of the shops and businesses in Ditchling, Keymer and Hassocks.

No16 Sussex Army Cadet Force: We are delighted that the Army Cadet Force, stationed in Hurstpierpoint, have once again offered to collect for Poppy Appeal in Hassocks on Saturday **26th October**.

All our Poppy Boxes take cash but they will also have a QR Code that can be scanned with a smart phone, which will then be able to take a card donation.

Ditchling Field of Remembrance: This year we are hoping to introduce for the first time our own Field of Remembrance which will be sited in a designated space within the Ditchling War Memorial enclosure.

This will be an opportunity for everyone to not only remember those sacred names carved on the War Memorial itself, but also to be able to personalise a poppy cross with the name of a family member or friend who has at any time served with the Armed Forces.

In principle, remembrance crosses will be available in all our Poppy Boxes with a larger amount in the Ditchling Post Office. The concept is that for a donation you can personalise your remembrance



cross with family or a friend's name. Crosses should then be returned to the Ditchling Post Office.

On the weekend before Remembrance Sunday (2nd/3rd November), the crosses will be collected and set out in a formal Field of Remembrance at Ditchling War Memorial. The Field of Remembrance will remain in place for a month.

We very much hope you will embrace this opportunity to honour a loved one who previously served; and remind all of us of our gratitude to them. Please remember that this act of remembrance of naming a poppy cross is open to anyone who has served, during both war and peacetime, regular or reserves.

Remembrance Day Parade. Sunday - 10th November. The Act of Remembrance Service will take place at Ditchling War Memorial, on Sunday 10th November at 11 am for the two minutes silence. The Parade, led by Burgess Hill Marching Youth Band, will start from St Margaret's School and everyone taking part in the Parade should be outside the school entrance in Lewes Road, ready to step off no later than 10.20 am. St Margaret's School will be open from 10 am.

Each year we have a fantastic attendance from the Guides, Brownies, Scouts, Cubs and Beavers, their Section Leaders, plus our RBL Legion Members. However, we would also really like to invite more adults and family's to parade with us as well.

One does not need to have personally served to march with the parade or be a member of RBL. If you have a relative or friend who deserves to be remembered, please do consider coming to march with us to the War Memorial. It is absolutely your right to do so. You might wish to remember a parent, aunt, uncle, brother, sister, grandparent, great grandparent who served; if you have their medals, you are also entitled to wear them (please fix these to the right hand breast pocket).

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Most of us have a relative or a name at least of some family member who has had a connection with the Services. If you do, then please do come and join us for the parade. It is genuinely such a privilege on this one day of the year to take time out to attend and remember them during the two minutes silence.

It is a lovely friendly atmosphere, and of course the more adults that we have on parade, the greater significance and importance the event has for all our young people also marching. In an age when we have less veterans to attend the parade, it falls to us to ensure that we honour and remember those that went before.

The service will start at 10.50 am, and everyone is very welcome to attend. Once the ceremonials at the War Memorial have ended a further service will take place in St Margaret's Church.

This year we would be honoured to include your personalised Poppy Cross in our new Ditchling Field of Remembrance. In addition, we would be delighted if you would march with us from the St Margaret's School to the War Memorial.


