

**NEWS FROM STONEYWISH - A DITCH-LING ADVENT CALENDAR.** This Advent, I thought it might be fun to make a calendar of 'glimpses' of Christmas past at Stoneywish. So, if you care to do so, please open the windows with me.

No.1: Here is East End Farm – a cluster of haystacks and cornstacks; a yard with hens and geese running free; horses and milking cows, in frosty stalls and stables; great elm trees standing sentinel round a Sussex flint barn.

2: Villagers playing ice hockey on the frozen farm pond, with milk churns for goalposts and improvised hockey-sticks.

3: Christmas 1938 – a hard winter. Michael is born into a world of snow. His father, who has cattle pastured in a field at Keymer, hauls hay on a sledge across the fields to feed them.

4: Moonlight gleaming on the barn's slate roof. Milking is done by hand, by the light of oil lamps at 5 a.m. and 3 p.m. The milk churns are heaved onto a brick stollage at the farm entrance, to be collected by the milk lorry once a day.

5: The farm children rolling snow into big balls in the top yard to build a snowman. The ache of cold

hands and feet.

6: Christmas shopping in the village. Michael stops to peer at the dazzling display of soaps in the window of the chemist's at the top of the High Street. This year, he will buy some for his mother from Mrs. Sinden, mother of the soon-to-be-famous actor, Donald.

7: Michael's father brings a cartload of kale each day from the fields to feed the cows. This supplements their winter diet of cattle-cake and sweet hay, cut from the haystacks with a broad-bladed hay knife and carried on pitch-forks across the yard to be stacked in heaps in the cowstalls. The cows will stay snug inside until the spring.

8: 1947 brings deep snow and the children make themselves a sledge out of a sheet of tin with the front end folded up. This provides exhilarating rides down Lodge Hill, with 5 children hanging on and hurling themselves off into the snow before an inevitable crash into the hedge at the bottom.

9: Sweet rations are saved to be spent on toffees and pear drops in Mr. Kydd's sweet shop (now Parker's) in the High Street.

10: Cold weather is needed as the 15 to 20 cockerels, which have been reared for Christmas, are

dispatched and plucked and hung in the barn, ready for collection. Those who have plucked them will have sore thumbs to remember them by. One year is disastrously mild and the birds go off!

11: The children cut up strips of paper to make paper-chains. Michael's mother works as a packer for the Ditchling Press and each day on the way home from school, Michael calls in to see her in the packing room in South Street. Often, he is sent home with off-cuts of paper to draw on. At Christmas there are spare Christmas cards to colour in. The press works day and night and the sound of the machinery can be heard in the street, a reminder, like the sound of the blacksmith's hammer, that the village is a hive of industry.

12: Michael is put to work grinding mangels (big turnips) for the calves to eat. The mangel-grinder, like a giant cheese-grater on legs is worked by turning a wheel, much like the wheel on an old-fashioned clothes mangle. This is a good job for a frosty day. Michael always says wintry weather is 'the Master's weather', the workers having to work hard to keep warm!

13: Christmas Day in the Alford farmhouse: Up early to milk and feed the cows.

14: The family set off on their bicycles to Mass at St. George's. They tramp in at the back in their wellington boots while the nuns sit demurely screened at the front.

15: Home to breakfast, cooked on the black-leaded kitchen range.

16: The highlight of Christmas. The children jump up and down excitedly outside the sitting-room door, waiting to be let in to see the decorated tree and open their Christmas stockings. These are long black nurse's stockings, belonging to Aunty Vena, which are hung from the mantel-piece, each containing an orange, a colouring book, sweets and pencils.

17: Christmas dinner chicken and sprouts and brandy flaming round a home-made Christmas pudding - the kitchen filled with delicious smells and excited voices.

18: Afternoon milking. The children are taken off to visit Grandfather Stenning, who sits in state to receive them, flanked on either side by a giant toy rabbit and dog. He means it kindly, but it is rather overwhelming to children who would rather be kicking round the farmyard.

19: Evening and a fire blazes in the hearth at home. Ribbons of gaslight steal through the curtains onto the frosty garden. Michael's father takes up his lantern and checks all the animals for the night. There will be cocks crowing at dawn.

The children, tired, are tucked into bed, hugging the memory of their best presents ever - little

milking stools made by a carpenter neighbour. An owl hoots from the ink-black meadows, where another world stirs beneath the stars.

21: A new era: Michael, grown up with children of his own, heaves himself off to milk the cows, leaving the family drowsy from lunch. Invigorated by the fresh air and exertion, he returns home ready to eat Christmas dinner all over again!

22. A few years later, just as the family are sitting down to their turkey, Michael is called out to a fire. Now a retained fireman, he instantly abandons the feast and dashes off to the Station in Keymer. It is a familiar tale - there will actually be three fires to put out this day - but for the crew the job never loses its thrill. It is a point of honour to turn out to every call and never to be late and at the end of it all, no matter how tired he may feel, the cows still have to be milked.

23: A Stoneywish Christmas in the early days: Michael's daughter, Anna, serves cake and mulled wine in the Tea Room (former Dairy), while a retired fireman, ensconced as Father Christmas in a veritable forest of greenery in the barn, takes so long, spinning his tales to the children, his little customers begin to freeze in the queue. Suddenly the electricity fuses out. The public drift away, leaving carol singers singing to a yard empty of all but a row of chickens, roosting on a rail...

24. This year? The stars and moon still sail over the barn. The sound of Michael chopping wood resounds from the place where the cowstall used to be. New people, new worlds come and go, but the old worlds are still with us as long as we make them welcome. Now a festive toast:

May your memories and your lives be as full as the best Christmas bumper. And good health and good cheer to you all! *Rosemary*

WESTMESTON PARISH HALL invite you to two fascinating local history talks at the hall on Friday **28th February** starting at 2 pm. Tea, coffee and cakes will be provided. Entry is free of charge, but donations will be requested on the day. There is ample parking at the hall.

The first talk is 'With a Spade on the 'Greensand Way', the Roman road and other nearby Roman discoveries from Hassocks to Barcombe Mills, by Dr David Rudling, Director of the Sussex School of Archaeology and History. This talk will review the evidence for the stretch of the east-west aligned Roman road between Hassocks and Bridge Farm, near Barcombe Mills. We will consider the road itself and various settlements along it or near it, ie those at Stone Pound Hassocks (nucleated settlement and cemetery), Clayton (villa), Plumpton (villa), Ditchling (farmstead), Chiltington (pottery kilns), Barcombe (villa and detached bathhouse), and Bridge Farm (a nucleated road and river side settlement).

Ditchling History Project will then give a talk on 'Milking to Munitions' - the World War II Diary of George Thomas, Patrol Leader of Ditchling's Secret Auxiliary Unit.

Born in 1913 at Spatham Farm, Westmeston, George was well known locally as farmer, sportsman and a writer keeping a diary throughout the Second World detailing life on the farm as well as his wartime service on the Home Front.

#### DITCHLING NATURE SPACE- A NEW PROJECT BETWEEN DITCHLING AND

**KEYMER** The opportunity to purchase the field north of the Keymer Road next to the new car park in Ditchling on behalf of the village came about because it went up for sale at the beginning of this year and was eventually purchased by a family in Ditchling in order to stop it being sold to a possible developer. It was purchased for a sum of £130,000 on the understanding that it would be bought back in due course and used by the community in some way or other. A Working Party was set up comprising representatives from the principal Ditchling organisations with the aim of doing this and identifying what could be done with the land, to whom it would belong, and how it would be financed and managed.

The field lies within the South Downs National Park. The land itself is around 2.7 acres and runs along beside a 200m length of the Keymer Road. There is a fall of around 5 metres from east to west and the western end is boggy. There is a ditch along the northern boundary, where there are several large oak trees, into which the outfall of the village pond discharges. It adjoins the South East Water Pumping Station to the west, which they have used as a pilot project for nature regeneration. The field was stripped of topsoil in the early 1990's and the east end is dry and firm. It has been used for grazing a few rescue horses over the last few years, but the grassland is poor. A wide range of opinion has been sought both around the village and elsewhere (including Hassocks) and advice has been sought from numerous organisations about conservation and management of the land. The general view is that the land should developed as a natural green space that can be enjoyed by the Community. The character and topography lends itself to a natural division into broadly three parts, the western end which could be developed as a wetland habitat, the middle, an open space which could be grassland and the end near the car park which could be used for occasional functions, such as the housing of the traditional Fairground on Fair Day for which the Village Green would not be suitable.

It is as important to decide what it will not be used for!

There are numerous ideas that have been put forward by different parties and it will be necessary, over time, to settle on some simple ones that do not require major changes to the existing field. We have received a lot of encouragement from numerous environmental organisations who are willing to give advice





and, in some cases, grants for developments in specific areas, such as wetland habitats. There is a lot of concern about the safety of the footpath along the Keymer Road and there may be ways in which the purchase of the land will allow improvements to be made.

Efforts have been made by the Working Party set up to take the project forward to obtain pledges of financial support. Following the open meeting on the 9th November in the Barn, over 60 individuals have come forward to pledge their support and the total sum promised is now £124k, and this is still rising. The efforts have not ceased and there is increasing confidence that the initial target will be reached. However, we will still need further money to undertake work and to pay for annual maintenance once we have purchased the land!



**DITCHLING HISTORY PROJECT** The timber framed building at the southwest corner of Ditchling crossroads, dating from the 16th century and currently undergoing extensive renovation, is the subject of a detailed project recently completed by Ditchling History Project. The property's long and fascinating history has been uncovered through painstaking deciphering of Manorial records, mostly written in Latin in many and varied This work, along with searches hands. through wills, newspaper reports and reminiscences, throws light on the lives of both owners and occupiers, their fascinating and sometimes unexpected stories enriching our knowledge not only of the building but of village society over four centuries. Information shared by owner's past and present is also gratefully acknowledged.

An eighty-page in depth study compiled by Judith Davies has been passed to the current owners while the project has raised the idea of encouraging others to explore the history of their own Ditchling properties. You can find out more on our new DHP noticeboard in Lewes Road at the entrance to the village hall. Our activities for the new year begin on Wednesday **8th January** with the first of our monthly drop-ins held in the White Horse every second Wednesday from 2 pm.

We will be at a history event in Westmeston Parish Hall on Friday **28th February** to give a talk about local farmer George Thomas who kept a diary throughout the Second World War describing his farming life as well as his duties as a member of the Home Guard, later becoming Patrol Leader for Ditchling's secret Auxiliary Unit. 



### THE MONDAY GROUP'S BIGGEST PROJECT TO DATE COMPLETED



The bridleway and parallel footpath running from Oldland Mill to Lodge Hill Lane had, over the years, become increasingly difficult to negotiate during or after wet weather.

Heavy foofall and poor drainage resulted in many sections of thick mud, several over 6inches deep.

Phase 1 of the project, to improve the bridleway section, started in late 2022. Most of the problems resulted from some subsidence of the origi-

nal hard surface, which needed to be raised in a manner that wouldn't impede horse riders or cyclists

who had a right to use the route.



By February 2023 some 17 tonnes of hard surface material was laid by hand along the whole length of the bridleway, underlaid where necessary by good quality brick hardcore donated by a local landowner. Phase 2, of the project, to improve the footpath itself, making one

of the best local views of the Downs, from Ditchling Beacon to Jack and Jill, and Wolstonbury more accessible, started in March 2023 and has now been completed.

A continuous walkway over 300ft long

has been installed, raised off the ground to provide a level walking surface and allowing the surface water to find its own way without creating the impassable muddy pockets that

> previously made using the path so difficult. Each section has a durable oak frame, topped with high quality decking boards to give good grip when wet.

Whilst the Group provides all its labour for free, partial funding for the materials came from a very generous donation of the proceeds of the 2022 and 2023 Ditchling Local Views calendars, and also by many individual donations received over the course of the project.

In my line of work, you're never sure what's going to happen from one day to the next. These past few months we've had a lot of injured or ill pigeons brought in which are then quickly passed on to the excellent Wildlife Organisation which operates locally. The ones that survived were recently released in the park, so well done and thank you to those who took the trouble to pick them up and bring them in.

bing them in. As always, this time of the year we take delivery of the Kit Wilson Trust Donations Box. They do a great job rescuing and rehoming a large variety of animals. So, if you've got any unused food, medicines or accessories you'd like to donate to help any of the animals in their care, then please feel free to pop them in the box and I'll make sure it's there for them when collected in the New Year. The thing to remember is these smaller charities don't always get the support that the bigger ones do this time of year. As I mentioned at the beginning of this article, I'm never sure what's going to happen, but I will say I do hear about people who buy pets and then seem to not want to look after them properly or decide just not to feed them. I had a couple come to see me about two cats they knew about that were not being cared for properly and could I help. I said I'll do my best but only if the owner consented to them being rehomed, the next day I had a phone call to say they had got one of them and could they bring it over. When they arrived all I could see looking out of the cat carrier were these huge orange eyes, but this wasn't a moggie, this was a Persian cat with the flat nose and seemed to be struggling to breathe. When I got it out the box it was just like handling a bunch of twigs, she was so bony I was frightened something might snap if I didn't handle her carefully. I immediately took her upstairs away from my other cats, I needed to check her over properly before I'd let her mix with mine. She'd obviously not been wormed, was covered in fleas, had ear mites and the way she fell into a bowl of water was probably dehydrated as well. As the couple left the shop, they said they would see if they could find her sister and by the way her name is Marshmallow. She now needed feeding up so I put her on a raw diet using Natural Instincts Pure Chicken which she just inhaled, raw is the best be-

Personally, I don't think it's right to breed cats like this, but the breed is hundreds of years old so it's not likely to change anytime soon. Marshmallow will obviously stay with us now so pop in anytime to see her and watch her progress. I'm still trying to get hold of her sister but have had little success at the moment, but if she's anywhere near as bad as Marshmallow was then her chances of survival are very slim. You can follow Marshmallow on our Facebook page 'Hassocks Pet Centre' or come in and donate towards her keep.
